1. Describe the applicant organization's mission, history and areas of expertise. Describe the applicant's experience in tourism promotion on Bainbridge Island and its demonstrated ability to complete the proposed project.

The mission of the Bainbridge Island Historical Museum (BIHM) is to collect, preserve, and foster knowledge of Bainbridge Island history. The museum accepts, documents, preserves, and displays photographs, records and artifacts acquired from Island businesses and residents. BIHM supports historic preservation in the community by supporting the city's Historic Preservation Commission, maintaining and storing the city's historic property inventory and by encouraging property owners to preserve the unique history of their sites and structures.

Our expertise in tourism operation and expansion is demonstrated by the ever increasing numbers of people attracted to the museum through its semi-permanent exhibit and its temporary exhibits as well as other programs and activities offered by the museum. Not only do the numbers demonstrate this, but the awards the Museum has received are ample proof that we excel in this regard. (see below for visitor numbers)

Tourists are such an important constituency that BIHM raised more than one-half million dollars to move the historic schoolhouse in 2004 from a remote park, inaccessible by public transportation, to within walking distance of the ferry dock in Winslow and within two blocks of Highway 305.

Since that move in 2004, our visitor numbers have been steadily increasing. Most of the increase can be attributed to tourist visitation. Easy access, facility improvement, and new exhibits since 2004 have made the museum a major draw for visitors from near and far.

The museum has demonstrated its significance and expertise by garnering the following awards during the past four years:

2012 – Washington Museum Association Award of Project Excellence for “Once Upon a Time – History Day Camp”

2012 – Washington Museum Association Award of Exhibit Excellence for “It's About Time” (Bainbridge Island history timeline on the south exterior wall of the museum)

2013 – Washington Museum Association Award of Exhibit Excellence for “The Overland Westerners”

2013 – Washington Museum Association Award of Individual Excellence for Executive Director Hank Helm

2013 – WSA 110 Certificate of Merit for Community Leadership “Education and Young People”

2014 American Association for State and Local History Award of Exhibit Excellence for “The Overland Westerners” (The only award for Exhibits in Washington)

2015 Washington Museum Association Award of Exhibit Excellence for our “Walkway Through History” exhibit in the Ferry Terminal. This is the 5th consecutive year for the Museum to win this Award

Along with the awards and recognition has come publicity. This has included major articles in the Kitsap Sun, Bainbridge Review, Seattle Times, Northwest Asian Weekly and New York Times. Other papers have featured the museum as well. The publicity has led to significantly increased visitation and has drawn tourists from around Washington, other states and foreign countries as well.

Project Information

1. Describe the proposed project.

- a. Identify the Project's main objectives and how each will be achieved.
The objective is to keep the museum open for the increased hours; seven days per week from 10 am until 4 pm every day of the year. We also expect to demonstrate the number of nightly stay-overs as indicated in our guest log. The grant would insure that we are adequately staffed during all open hours including weekends. The grant would pay for our Volunteer Coordinator to schedule and be responsible for the seventh open day plus the added open hours each week.
- b. Be as specific as possible about the proposed services, measurable impacts, distribution method and costs.
The proposed service is tourist access to the museum as noted in a. The measurable impacts will be the records kept of visitors and statistics from our visitor register. We believe we document visitor information as well as, or better than, any other island tourist facility.
- c. If appropriate, provide details about the facility operating costs to be funded.
We currently have no capital budget. Please see attached for operating budget and costs. Also please see our prior year annual report which is attached. The specific operating costs requested are detailed in the budget under item 2 below.

2. Provide a brief narrative statement to address each of the stated selection criteria. Describe outcomes anticipated from each criterion, as well as the overall project.

- a. Expected impact on increased tourism in 2017. Please provide specific estimates of how the project will impact the number of people traveling to Bainbridge Island from fifty miles or more one way from their place of residence, or travelling from another country or state outside of Washington State. If appropriate, compare/contrast this impact to actual or estimated number of tourists at your event/facility in 2015 and estimates for 2016.
When the Museum increased visitor hours and opened new exhibits in 2011, visitation increased by 48%. (See visitor statistics history in 2015 Annual Report page 3.) Maintaining those increased hours enabled continued attendance growth in both 2013 and 2014. In 2015 visitation leveled off (14,516 in 2015, compared to 14,866 the previous year). Through the end of August 2016 we have received 10,107 visits, close to the 10,437 visits for the same period in 2015. We are mounting a major new exhibit in the early fall, and we anticipate this will bring our final visitor tally to at least 2015 levels. The measurable outcome for 2017 will be actual, recorded visitation records.
- b. Expected impact on or increase in overnight stays on the island. Please include actual or estimated numbers of tourists who will stay overnight in paid accommodations in Bainbridge lodging establishments in 2017 as a result of proposed activities. Please include the basis for any estimates.
Through the end of August, for 2016, the Museum had 2,555 visitors from Washington residents who did not live on Bainbridge (a 4% increase over the same period in 2015), 3,967 from other states (14% increase), and 942 overseas visitors (a 3% decrease). During this period, 432 visitors made an overnight stay, up slightly from the 405 in 2015. We

therefore expect our 2016 year-end total of overnight stays to equal or exceed the 539 we recorded in 2015. 2017 outcomes will be measured by actual visitation statistics.

- c. Projected economic impact on Bainbridge Island businesses, facilities, events and amenities, including sales of overnight lodging, meals, tours, gifts, and souvenirs (helpful data may be found on the Washington State Department of Commerce website).

There is no direct information or data that allows us to measure economic impact. Indirect and anecdotal information from visitors as well as comments in our guest book tell us there is a significant impact. Visitors frequently ask docents for recommendations on shops and restaurants. We consistently give suggestions of routes to take and how to see the Winslow area as well as other areas on the island (like nurseries, motels, parks, etc.). Where possible, we assist visitors without cars to call for BI RIDE buses. Our docents serve as good-will ambassadors.

We work closely with the Bainbridge Island Japanese American Community and the Bainbridge Island Japanese American Exclusion Memorial Association to coordinate tours and visits to the Japanese American Exclusion Memorial. We are the contact for phone inquiries about the Memorial. As part of our mission we also coordinate tours and visits for school and other groups to the Day Road Farms. Many of these groups are from Seattle, the University of Washington, Japan and other areas. We know that these activities have a direct economic impact.

The museum functions as a *de facto* visitor center. We have people inquire where the Art Museum and Children's Museum are located, if there is a waterfront trail, where to buy ice cream, souvenirs, etc., and they especially appreciate our immaculate bathrooms! We hand out many island maps, walkabout guides and ferry schedules as well as the Driving Tour and Walking Tour brochures produced by the Bainbridge Island Historical Museum (revised and updated in 2013). We have a large copy of the Chamber of Commerce map of the island mounted in the museum to point out locations of interest on the island as a direct result of inquiries.

To obtain a sense of the impact of the museum, and learn more about the island, we invite the LTAC committee to visit the museum, either as a group or individually. Our Executive Director will be happy to provide a personalized tour!

- d. The project's potential to draw visitors to the Island and increase overnight stays during the off-season, i.e. October 1 until Memorial Day.

Please see the attached visitation graph showing the number of off-season visitors for the previous five seasons. This number has increased each year, though it is leveling off. Historically, more than 50% of annual visitation to the Museum has been between Labor Day and Memorial Day

- e. The applicants' demonstrated history of organizational and project success.
The best demonstration of history of success is that the museum has been in existence since 1948 and its incorporation in 1978! The growth in visitation, particularly since 2012, demonstrates the success of the funding provided by the LTAC grants for additional hours.

- f. Describe any partnerships with other organizations and businesses in the proposed project – including efforts to minimize duplication of services where appropriate and encourage cooperative marketing.

We have no specific partnerships for this application, however we partner with numerous

organizations on a regular basis.

We are members of the Chamber of Commerce and of the Downtown Association. We act as the clearing house and reference location for docents at the Bainbridge Island Japanese American Exclusion Memorial. The National Park Service passport stamp for visitors to the Memorial is maintained at the Museum. The National Park Service Ranger for the Memorial uses the museum as his off-site office location. We distribute maps of how to get to the Memorial and facilitate visits. Our phone number is listed for information about the Memorial. Our exhibits give additional information about this important part of Bainbridge history. The Executive Director of the Museum is a member of the Board of Directors of the Bainbridge Island Japanese American Exclusion Memorial Association. We work closely with the Bainbridge Island School District, local private schools, IslandWood, The Library, Arts and Humanities Bainbridge, the Senior Center, and Global Source Education. We contribute historically-themed signage to the Ferry terminal and several downtown locations.

YEAR IN REVIEW

GENERAL

This has been a challenging, rewarding and very busy year for our staff and board of directors. We have had some wonderful fundraisers and other activities including the "Huddle", "History 101", a great summer camp, many student groups, adult groups, the Yama Project, as well as many other items. Please see the rest of this report to learn about the activities.

In keeping with our Strategic Plan, Tim Bird was hired as Volunteer Coordinator. Tim was hired half time, and then increased to thirty-five hours per week when our Administrative Coordinator Dan Groff reduced his hours to thirty hours per week to have more personal time. The hiring of Tim allowed Katy Curtis to spend more time on our ever-increasing education and outreach activities.

VISITATION

The number of visitors to the museum leveled off this year after 15% and 22% increases in the previous two years. We had over 14,500 visitors in 2015. Comparison of visitors over the last five years can be seen on the graph on page three of this report. The number of members visiting was up by 3% while visitors from other states were down by 3.4% and visitors from other countries were down by 11%.

FINANCIAL & FUNDRAISING

We did not quite make our budget for the year. This is the first year since I have been with the museum that we failed to meet the budget. This has been nine years or since 2006. However, our balance sheet remains strong and we ended the year with over \$200,000 in cash and savings.

The Clay Jenkinson "Teddy Roosevelt event was the biggest fundraiser of the year and was very well attended in spite of high winds and rain throughout the day. Board Member Everett DuBois did an outstanding job of heading up the board group that organized and did yeoman's work on the event.

Personal memberships accounted for \$32,691 and the annual appeal brought in \$19,175.

Store sales declined a bit from the previous year with the total being \$9,304.

Once again, our raffle was a great success with the grand prize winner, Susan Morton taking home the \$5000 first prize check.

The Virginia V was a sellout again and the weather turned out to be perfect.

The annual Lives and Lies event was held at HeyDay Farm and again was a sellout. The venue was a large tent provided by the farm. The food was great and the stories were fascinating.

On the expense side of the financial report, salaries were up as the Board gave the staff a nice salary increase. This is the first substantial increase in several years.

GRANTS & DONATIONS

We received \$12,000 from the city through the Lodging Tax/Tourism Fund grant application fund, \$200 from Bainbridge Performing Arts for collaboration on the play Snow Falling on Cedars, \$4,000 from Bainbridge Community Foundation and \$4,000 from the Rotary Club of Bainbridge Island. The Bainbridge Community grant supported the museum's general operations. The new flat screen monitor was funded from the Rotary Club Grant as were two new computers. General donations were down because of one expected donation was not received. We received \$18,883 from One Call for All and \$10,900 from Business Support Donors. We provided monetary support for the work done at Yama during the summer including general support to Olympic College and funding two field supervisors.

The membership lists and categories itemized in this report do not reflect the true extent of our members' generosity. Many members also contribute through One Call For All, donate to our Annual Appeal and participate in our fundraising events. We sincerely appreciate the multiple ways our members support BIHM.

The Japanese/Filipino Agricultural Inventory Exhibits were part of a grant from the Washington Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation. The first phase of this summary exhibit was launched online as a Virtual Exhibit through PastPerfect on our website. Kim Grant, the State Certified Local Government & Survey Program Manager circulated a bulletin that singled out our online technique as "GREAT STUFF!" Hard copy versions of the exhibit were mounted at City Hall and our outside exhibit shelter.




2015 Statistics

The graph below illustrates some of BIHM's vital statistics over a five year period. This gives an indication of the tremendous progress achieved in all areas measured. The increase in attendance in 2013 and 2014 was amazing so to see this year somewhat less is probably to be expected. It is a leveling off. 


2015 Financials

2015 Curatorial Highlights

By Rick Chandler

Collections

Both the quantity and the quality of donated artifacts and documents appear to be on the rise. The PastPerfect catalog database now exceeds 15,000 items. In a year when fire-arm regulations were widely featured in the news we accepted the Pringle's Polittkofsky Cannon and the Munro family's "Long Tom" shotgun. The Oligario Collection of photographs and oral histories greatly adds to

our holdings of Filipino family material. A "High School office cleanout" collection brought in many scholastic images from the 1940's. Gary White, author of our Hall Brothers book, gave us 6 boxes of related documents including primary business and personal documents. After a strong color photo debut article in the B.I. Review our "demon chasing chung kwei" doll brought our doll collection up to 17. Fifty back issues of our Museum Newsletter have been added digitally to the PastPerfect database.

Our 82nd accession of the year is a marvelous collection of Yama and Port Blakely archaeological artifacts given to us by Islandwood. We are still processing the over 100 pieces which include objects from Nagaya and the Hawaiian Village.

Exhibits

As Part of the "Snow Falling on Cedars" collaboration with Bainbridge Performing Arts in March, a diverse collection of exhibit material was mounted in the BPA lobby areas. Originally intended as a showcase for our *Ansel Adams Manzanar* exhibit, the display was expanded to include full size panels from the UW/Klondike Museum exhibit "Community of Courage" which was given to us by the National Park Service. Also displayed were copies of Sada Omoto's paintings, propaganda posters, our 1942 & 1943 High School composites, and objects from the set of the movie "Snow Falling on Cedars."

In April the "Community of Courage" exhibit that we helped the UW students develop was chosen to receive the **Association of King County Historical Organization's Heritage Education Award**. After the Memorial Wall unveiling of the bas relief sculpture "Echoes of the Taken," by Heidi Westweet, the piece was mounted at the Museum. The bas relief and the Tag Display were featured in the May issue of the NPS Minidoka Newsletter.

New ferry walkway quiz banners were mounted, new sandwich boards were created for street signage, and a reader board was put into service to advertise changing programs.

The Overland Westerners exhibit continued its ride through history. Kitsap Sun reporter Tristan Baurick timed the release of his newly produced multimedia publication to coincide with the centennial anniversary of the riders arrival in San Francisco. Our original panels were remounted for display in the Schoolhouse Gallery. The summer issue of the AASLH magazine HISTORY NEWS featured the Overland Westerners exhibit in its article *Learning from Liesure* as a notable example of "how overlooked history can lead to creating new audiences." The new Chief Historian at the US Census Bureau featured our Overland Westerners exhibit as a "perfect" example of using census data in their #MuseumMondays and other social media sites.

One traveling copy of the Whale exhibit is currently on display at the Langley Whale Center on Whidbey Island

Facilities

While the Museum remodel reached substantial completion by the end of 2014 the process of moving back in and reorganizing continued well into 2015. The new Vizio 65" video screen was installed in the library in April. Off-site storage increased to a fourth location with the addition of a small heated unit at Reliable Storage.

The large office space at the Dentist building on Ericksen is full and there is a possibility that it may become unavailable. On-site storage is still flexible and with careful packing and handling should remain sufficient for incoming materials for some time to come. Long term storage solutions will need to be addressed as needed.

Historic Preservation

The Blakeley Award for Preservation Leadership went to the Fort Ward Youth Advisory Committee for their efforts to preserve the Fort Ward Bakery. The Award for Project Excellence went to Joe and Beth Claseman for their restoration of the McRedmond cabin.

The three large trees near the historic Cave family greenhouse location by Harbor Square Condominiums were accepted into the City's Heritage Tree Program. Both the Blakely Award program and the heritage tree program were given good coverage by the local media.

Management of city-owned agricultural properties was an ongoing discussion topic. The Suyematsu property is in the process of being added to the local register of historic places. The information/nomination packets of the 27 properties on the COBI Local Register are being scanned and added to the PastPerfect database in the "Sites and Localities" catalogue.

Special Projects

The Heritage Preservation ReCAP assessments were completed early in the year. The "Collection" report and the "Architectural" report should provide solid guidance for our long range institutional sustainability and growth. The reports were funded by a \$7190 grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. Our timing for participating in this program was fortuitous as the program has now been put on indefinite hold.

The Yama project has been widely documented by local media and public interest seems very high. The Washington Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation issued the field work permit in late June and site work began on 1 July. The Bainbridge Community foundation selected the Yama Project as the recipient of their annual Trustees Award which recognizes great collaboration between local nonprofits. In addition to the major

In parallel, the Seattle Opera was preparing for the world premiere of *An American Dream*, an opera set in the 1940s which addresses issues of broken families and racial bigotry fueled by war. Following his visit to Bainbridge Island, Nick Malinowski, Community Programs Manager at the Seattle Opera, commented, "I loved the exhibit that was on display in the lobby at BPA. I also loved hearing the testimonials from the women who had themselves been forcibly removed and incarcerated." BIHM went on to serve as advisor for the show, facilitating community relationships and providing expertise. As the production developed, testimonials from Kay Nakao, Lilly Kodama, and Felix Narte Jr. helped to advise the Seattle Opera. They never guessed this would lead to becoming cast members, the first on stage, performing a monologue of the impact of the war in their lives.

Our most successful programs included Clay Jenkinson's performance as Theodore Roosevelt at

classroom weekly where students read aloud and give insight to the impact of the language style of the 70's. Through this project we hope to preserve the original text as an historic document, make minimal revisions, add footnotes with chapter notes, and reintroduce *They Cast a Long Shadow* into the local school curriculum for the 2016-2017 school year.

All in all it was a successful year, and we are looking forward to offering more opportunities and adding new audiences in the year to come. We are only able to offer these engaging and well received programs with the generous help of all our volunteers. We appreciate the hours of expertise, creativity, organizing skills and energy shared.

2015 Education and Outreach Report By Katy Curtis



This was yet another exceptional and rewarding year for our museum as we continue to grow in our role as representatives of Bainbridge Island history and culture.

Our success can be measured by the number of students who came to learn about Bainbridge Island's story and the number of our resident and non-resident patrons who came to visit out of curiosity. The year of 2015 has seen an increase in people reached by our programs: 9880, nearly a thousand more. Our effectiveness can be seen in the continued development of events with our local businesses and organizations, and in the expansion of creative educational programs and tours for students and special groups of all ages, from local and distant areas.

Nao Tase, from Tokyo Broadcasting System, visited the museum when Nao was on the island attending a special presentation. Nao logged this comment in the guestbook: 4/18/15 "You have some amazing things! Would love to come back with a crew!"

We experienced a record year for the number of students visiting the Museum with over 1,183 learners. This represents a 12% increase in the number of student visits compared to last year. These students represent 99 different student groups who

visited the museum or participated in museum educational programming for 2015.

In 2015, we were a part of many collaborative efforts with various local organizations. We continued our work with Only What We Can Carry Project (OWWCC) at EduCulture, the Suquamish Museum, Eagle Harbor Book Co., Bainbridge Public Library, Bainbridge Island Japanese American Community (BIJAC), Bainbridge Island Japanese American Exclusion Memorial Association (BIJAEMA), Bainbridge Island Arts and Humanities Council (BIAHC), and others. We were a part of several new major projects with the Bainbridge Performing Arts, Seattle Opera, KING 5 News, and the Kitsap County Historical Society. This year BIHM worked with over 40 organizations; and our staff and volunteers developed, partnered or contributed to over 200 events!

Members of BIHM helped to organize and participate in the presentation of two major stage productions. As part of their *Snow Falling on Cedars* production, the Bainbridge Performing Arts (BPA) partnered with BIHM on educational programming. A series of events were produced, including events with special guest speakers; panel discussions; and post-show question and answer sessions with Bainbridge Islanders. We created a special exhibit for the theater lobby of Ansel Adams Manzanar photos, artifacts from WWII, and artwork from exclusion of Japanese Americans. An opportunity for preview and activities was well received by middle school and high school classes.


